

The Elk City Reservoir dam is 5 miles northwest of Independence in Montgomery County. The Elk City wildlife area consists of about 12,500 acres and is managed for fishing and hunting. The 4,440-acre flood control reservoir is open to fishing, waterfowl hunting, and boating. Elk City state park is 624

acres, providing camping, hiking, picnicking, swimming, fishing, and sightseeing opportunities.

The area supports a variety of wildlife. Vegetation consists of big and little bluestem, Indiangrass, switchgrass, and other native warm season grasses, intermixed with successional woodlands and riparian corridors, cropland, and scattered wetlands. A prominent feature of the landscape is the precipitous limestone bluff known as Table Mound. Wind and erosion have created many scenic vistas on the limestone bluffs along the northern border of the park. In addition, autumn brings an abundance of color to the native trees along the bluff.

HUNTING

Large numbers of ducks and geese are attracted to the area wetlands and shallow flats in the reservoir's upper end. Area deer hunters have excellent opportunities on the numerous tributaries and wooded borders of crop fields. Wild turkeys are found on the area. Other game species include bobwhites, cottontail rabbits, and fox and gray squirrels. Excellent squirrel hunting can be found in the numerous oak-hickory and pecan groves. Common furbearers include beavers, raccoons, bobcats, coyotes, and opossums. Non-toxic shot is required when hunting managed dove fields.

No baiting is allowed on state and federal portions of Elk City Reservoir. Each hunter is allowed two treestands or portable blinds. They must be marked with the hunters's name and address or KDWPT number. Portable blinds must be removed daily.

Some interior roads are closed seasonally to improve wildlife habitat utilization and hunting quality.

CAMPING, PICNICKING AND BOATING

Elk City State Park features modern and primitive campsites, picnicking, modern restrooms and showers, drinking water, trailer sewage dump facilities, a group shelter, fishing piers, a three-lane boat launching ramp, and a swimming beach.

Camping is permitted in the state park campground. Toilets are available at Memorial Overlook Trailhead near the dam and at the state park trailhead. Quiet hours are observed between 11- p.m. and 8 a.m. in the state park. Group shelters may be reserved. Only shatterproof containers are allowed at the swimming beach. Pets must be contained and may not be left unattended in the state park.

FISHING

Elk City Reservoir offers great fishing opportunities for channel catfish, white bass, crappie, flathead catfish, and blue catfish. Hook-and-line and trotline anglers experience good success for catfish in the reservoir year-round. Spring fishing for spawning crappie occurs in the coves and asso-

BACKPACKING AND HIKING

The Green Thumb Nature Trail is a one-mile loop trail that begins in the state park campground just northwest of the park office. It presents a moderately strenuous hike leading to the top of the hill. There, a beautiful lake panorama is framed by ash and oak trees.


No hunting is permitted in the refuge area or state park at any time during the year. Angler and public access is permitted on the refuge area from April 1 thru August 31. No holes or pits may be dug for blinds on the wildlife area. Check the current hunting regulations summary for additional hunting requirements.

Camping is permitted in designated areas only. Please take all your trash with you when you leave.

SIGHTSEEING


